Genesis 25:19-26 – Scene 1: Birth of Esau & Jacob		
19a	Now these [are] the generations of Isaac, = Abraham's son.	▪
19b	Abraham fathered Isaac.	
20	Now Isaac was forty years old when he took Rebekah, = [who was] the daughter of Bethuel, = the Aramean from Paddan-aram, = [and] the sister of Laban, = the Aramean, to [be] a wife to him.	▪ Isaac: 40 years old at marriage
21a	And Isaac prayed to the LORD for his wife, because she [was] barren.	▪
21b	And the LORD granted his prayer, and Rebekah his wife conceived.	
22a	The children struggled together within her, and she said, “If it is thus, why is this happening to me?”	▪
22b	So she went to inquire of the LORD.	
23a	And the LORD said to her, “Two nations are in your womb, and two peoples from within you shall be divided; the one shall be stronger than the other, the older shall serve the younger.”	▪ Greater serves the smaller, younger.
23b		
24	And her days to give birth were completed, and look, there [were] twins in her womb.	▪ NET: Look! = The narrator invites the audience to view the scene as if they were actually present at the birth.

Genesis 25:19-26 – Scene 1: Birth of Esau & Jacob		
25	The first came out red, all his body like a hairy cloak, so they called his name Esau .	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ “Reddish” forms a wordplay on Edomites, Esau’s descendants. The writer sees in Esau’s appearance at birth a sign of what was to come.
26a	Then after this, his brother came out with his hand grasping Esau’s heel, so his name was called Jacob.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ NET: The name probably means something like “may he protect,” that is, as a rearguard, dogging the heels. It did not have a negative connotation until Esau redefined it.
26b	Now Isaac was sixty years old when she bore them.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ NET: This name was probably chosen because of the immediate association with the incident of grabbing the heel. ▪ Isaac: 60 years old when twins were born.
Literature Type: ➤ Story		▪
Main Character: ➤ Isaac: This section begins the “account of Isaac.”		▪
Other Characters: ➤ YHWH (The LORD): He answers Isaac’s prayer and speaks to Rabekah. ➤ Rabekah: God answers her question about the twins. ➤ Esau: He is born first and typically would receive a double inheritance. ➤ Jacob: He grasped his brother’s heel as he was born.		▪
Story Obstacles (<i>new tensions</i>): (1) Scene #1, Obstacle #1: ➤ How will YHWH establish his covenant with Isaac’s offspring, if Rabekah is barren? (See Genesis 17:19.) (2) Scene #1, Obstacle #2: ➤ Why are the twins struggling inside Rabekah’s womb? (3) Scene #1, Obstacle #3: ➤ How will it play out if the older serves the younger? [This is extremely counter-cultural.] <input type="checkbox"/> Foreshadowing: ▪ Laban is introduced (25:20). ▪ Conflict between Esau and Jacob is predicted (25:23, 26).		▪

<p>Tension Direction:</p> <p>(1) Scene #1, Obstacle #1: ➤ Tension resolved: Isaac prays. YHWH grants his prayer. Rebekah conceives.</p> <p>(2) Scene #1, Obstacle #2: ➤ Tension simmers: Rebekah inquires of YHWH. Will YHWH answer? What will be his answer?</p> <p>(3) Scene #1, Obstacle #3: ➤ Tension Increases: There are twins that will become two nations. The older will serve the younger. How will this play out?</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪
<p>Theme <i>(to original audience):</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ YHWH continues his everlasting covenant (Genesis 17:19) <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ By answering Isaac’s prayer for offspring ▪ And by prescribing that the older twin (Esau) will serve the younger, stronger one (Jacob). 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪
<p>Theology <i>(for all audiences):</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ God keeps his promises, even in bleak circumstances. ➤ God answers prayer and questions. ➤ God sometimes speaks to his people. ➤ God knows his people and has a plan for them... <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Even from the womb. ➤ Life begins at conception. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ <i>This is not a complete list.</i>
<p>Big Idea <i>(for our audience):</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Trust God for your future <i>(for a high school youth group)</i>. ➤ Trust God’s plan, when life’s a mess <i>(for a young couples’ study)</i>. ➤ Seek God when you don’t understand <i>(for a grief support class)</i>. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ <i>These are just examples.</i>
