Main Character:

Isaac: This section begins the "account of Isaac."

Other Characters:

- YHWH (The LORD): He answers Isaac's prayer and speaks to Rabekah.
- Rabekah: God answers her question about the twins.
- Esau: He is born first and typically would receive a double inheritance.
- Jacob: He grasped his brother's heel as he was born.

Story Obstacles (new tensions):

- (1) Scene #1, Obstacle #1:
 - ➤ How will YHWH establish his covenant with Isaac's offspring, if Rabekah is barren? (See Genesis 17:19.)

- (1) Scene #1, Obstacle #1:
 - Tension resolved: Isaac prays. YHWH grants his prayer. Rabekah conceives.

Story Obstacles (new tensions):

- (2) Scene #1, Obstacle #2:
 - Why are the twins struggling inside Rabekah's womb?

- (2) Scene #1, Obstacle #2:
 - Tension simmers: Rebekah inquires of YHWH. Will YHWH answer? What will be his answer?

Story Obstacles (new tensions):

- (3) Scene #1, Obstacle #3:
 - How will it play out if the older serves the younger? [This is extremely counter-cultural.]

- (3) Scene #1, Obstacle #3:
 - Tension Increases: There are twins that will become two nations. The older will serve the younger. How will this play out?

- Narrator perspective.
 - Narrator is gospel truth.

Main Character:

Esau: The narrator starts with Esau (25:27a) and ends with Esau (25:35b & c).

Other Characters:

➤ Jacob: He has two lines: (1) Sell me your birthright today; (2) Swear it today.

Story Obstacles (new tensions):

- (1) Scene #2, Obstacle #1:
 - Isaac loved Esau, but Rabekah loved Jacob.
 - Isaac loved Esau, because he had a taste for wild game.
 - Why did Rabekah love Jacob?

- (1) Scene #2, Obstacle #1:
 - Tension simmers: The only hint so far is because of YHWH's word. (See Genesis 25:23.)

Story Obstacles (new tensions):

- (2) Scene #2, Obstacle #2:
 - Esau was hungry after hunting and demanded some of Jacob's red stuff.
 - Jacob preys on Esau, offering to swap stew for Esau's double-inheritance.
 - How will Esau respond to such a shocking offer?

- (2) Scene #2, Obstacle #2:
 - Tension Increases: We read with shock and disgust that Esau agrees to the swap.

Story Obstacles (new tensions):

- (3) Scene #2, Obstacle #3:
 - Esau treated his inheritance as worthless and agreed to sell it for a bowl of soup.
 - Would Esau regret his decision?

- (3) Scene #2, Obstacle #3:
 - Tension Increases: We read with shock and disgust that Esau considered his birthright useless because he was "starving to death."

Story Obstacles (new tensions):

- (4) Scene #2, Obstacle #4:
 - Esau ate, drank, rose, and left. He showed no remorse.

- (4) Scene #2, Obstacle #4:
 - Tension resolved: The narrator summarizes Esau's evil character: Esau despised his birthright.



DOES IT HELP?

- □ Did Jacob steal Esau's birthright?
 - Esau gladly traded it for bean soup.
- □ Did Jacob steal Esau's blessing?
 - Rebekah devised the plan to honor God's word.

Main Character:

Rabekah: She overhears Isaac's plan, commands Jacob to participate in her plan, and performs most of the speaking and action in the scene.

Other Characters:

Jacob: He questions the viability of Rabekah's plan, but obeys his mother.

Story Obstacles (new tensions):

- (2) Scene #10, Obstacle #2:
 - Why does Rebakah want Isaac to bless Jacob rather than Esau (27:10)?

- (2) Scene #10, Obstacle #2:
 - Tension simmers: Rebekah schemes to fulfill God's word (25:23) by securing Isaac's blessing on the <u>younger</u> son (27:15).

Story Obstacles (new tensions):

- (4) Scene #10, Obstacle #4:
 - How can Rebekah take the curse in Jacob's place?

- (4) Scene #10, Obstacle #4:
 - Tension simmers: Rabekah will gladly absorb the curse, because her plan is an act of obedience (27:15) to God's word (25:23).

Tension Direction:

- (3) Scene #1, Obstacle #3:
 - Tension Increases: There are twins that will become two nations. The older will serve the younger. How will this play out?

- (5) Scene #1, Obstacle #3: How will it play out if the older serves the younger? (See Genesis 25:23.)
 - Tension simmers: Will Rabekah's obedience thwart Isaac's intent to disobey?
 - Tension simmers: Will YHWH use Rabekah to protect his plan?

Theme (to original audience):

- Rabekah works to obey God's word (25:23),
 - by scheming to gain Isaac's blessing on her <u>younger</u> son,
 - knowing of Isaac's love for his <u>older</u> son's wild game.

Theology (for all audiences):

- Dedience often carries a great price (27:13).
- God's plan is never thwarted, and he sometimes uses imperfect means to complete his plan.

Big Idea (for our audience):

- Count the cost (compare with Luke 14:27-30) (for various audiences).
- Embrace the imperfect (training for short-term missions).¹
