Teaching Skills



Goals:

A. Prepare

1. Describe your audience: Who? Where? Why?

2. Define the timeframe: How long?

3. Determine the format: Lecture? Participation? Technology? Visual aids?4. Pray: For your preparation. For the audience's response.

B. Plan

1. Create two or three "Lesson Aims" defining what you want to accomplish with the lesson.

- 2. Each lesson aim should focus on what the student should learn or do.
- 3. Each aim should use actions words and begin with the phrase: "The student will..."
 - a. Example: The student will <u>understand</u> that Abraham was made righteous by faith.

Steps:

A. Book: Teach the Text.

- 1. Craft a "Big Idea."
 - a. This should be a short, memorable statement.
 - b. It should be based on the passage's "theme" uncovered by your study of the text.
 - c. What one thing do you want the audience to remember?
 - d. Example: Faith made Abraham right with God.
- 2. Determine your approach to justify the Big Idea.
 - a. Options: walk through the passage, use storytelling, three alliterated points, etc.
- 3. Identify necessary explanations.
 - a. Key words, images, literary devices, flow of the argument, context, culture, etc.
 - b. Eliminate unnecessary explanations.
- 4. Design a logical outline.
 - a. Are the main points found in the biblical text?
 - b. Do the minor points support the main points?
- 5. Write a manuscript.
 - a. Creatively craft your ideal message in written form.
- 6. Practice, tweak, and cut.

B. Look: Identify Theological Connections [~ Tom Golding]

- 1. What does the passage say about God?
 - a. Examples: God makes promises. God expects faith. God makes us right with him.
- 2. What does the passage say about humankind?
 - a. Examples: We need to trust God's promises. We need to be made right with him.

C. Took: Provide Applications

- 1. Suggest a few practical actions based on the theology in the text.
 - a. Examples: What promises should you trust? Are you trusting Jesus to make you right with God?

D. Hook: Grab Attention

- 1. This is the first portion of the presentation, but the <u>last</u> step in the preparation.
- 2. What stories, illustrations, or actions will encourage the audience to listen?
 - a. Is your <u>Hook</u> connected to the explanations in your <u>Book</u>, the connections in your <u>Look</u>, and/or the applications in your <u>Took</u>?
