Exodus 33:1-6 – Scene 7: YHWH Won't Go with the Israelites.		
1a	Then the LORD spoke to Moses, "Go!	•
1b	Go up from this [place]— you and the people whom you brought up	
1c	from the land of Egypt, to the land	
1d	which I swore to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, saying, 'I will give it to your descendants.'	
2	I will send a messenger before you and I will drive out the Canaanites, the Amorites, the Hittites, the Perizzites, the Hivites and the Jebusites.	See Exodus 3:2. Messenger of YHWH at the burning bush.
3	[Go up] to a land flowing with milk and honey; for I will not go up in your midst—, for you [are] a stiff-necked people, —lest I destroy you on the way."	•
4	When the <b>people heard</b> this evil [i.e. disastrous] word, they mourned, and no one put on his ornaments upon himself.	<ul> <li>Ornaments were used for the calf</li> <li>"A man did not put on his ornaments upon himself."</li> </ul>
5a	For the LORD [had] said to Moses,  "Say to the sons of Israel,  "You [are] a stiff-necked people;  [If] I go up in your midst for one moment,  I [would] destroy you.	<ul> <li>NET: Removing the ornaments is a call to repentance. If they repented God would know how to deal with them.</li> </ul>
5b	Now, take off your ornaments from upon you, that I will know what I will do to you."	
6	So the sons of Israel stripped themselves of their ornaments, from Mount Horeb [onward].	•

# **Exodus – HDRT**

Main Character:  ➤ YHWH (the LORD)  ■ YHWH is the one speaking in this scene.	*	
Other Characters:  Moses  YHWH speaks to Moses (3:1).  A messenger (3:2)  Is this a human messenger, an angel, or YHWH himself?  The people (3:3)  They are stiff-necked, yet they did obey the command to remove ornaments.	• Note that in Exodus 3:12, the "messenger of YHWH" was specified, which turned out to be YHWH himself. Yet, the identity of the messenger is vague in this passage.	
<ul> <li>Story Obstacles (new tensions): <ol> <li>Obstacle #1: YHWH essentially disavows the Israelites when he states to Moses, "the people, whom you brought up from Egypt (3:1)."</li> <li>➤ Tension increases: Has YHWH abandoned us?</li> <li>Obstacle #2: YHWH will send a messenger to drive out the Canaanites (3:2), but he himself will not go with them.</li> <li>➤ Tension increases: How will we make it if YHWH does not go with us?</li> <li>Obstacle #3: YHWH will destroy the people, if he goes with them for even a moment.</li> <li>➤ Tension increases: How will we make it if YHWH does go with us?</li> </ol> </li> </ul>		
Plot Summary (obstacles + resolution):  ➤ YHWH opts to send a messenger in his place,  ■ because he (YHWH) would destroy the people,  ■ if he went with them for even a moment.	What is the main point of this scene?	
<ul> <li>Theme (to original audience):</li> <li>YHWH graciously withholds his presence</li> <li>so that Moses and the messenger can bring</li> <li>the people safely into the land of the Canaanites.</li> </ul>	What is the author's main point to his ancient audience?	

## **Exodus – HDRT**

#### Exodus 33:1-6 - Scene 7: YHWH Won't Go with the Israelites.

### Theological Statement (for all audiences):

- (1) Option 1: **Contrast** our New Testament position in Jesus with the Israelites after the golden calf treachery.
  - ➤ Unlike the Israelites leaving Egypt, we who trust Jesus:
    - will never be separated from God's love (Romans 8:35-36; 38-39),
    - for we are more than conquerors because of his love for us in Jesus (Romans 8:37).
- (2) Option 2: Connect the implicit warning in Exodus 33:1-6 with one of the explicit warning passages in the book of Hebrews.
  - ➤ **Just like** the Israelites leaving Egypt, we who trust in Jesus
    - must not harden our hearts (Hebrews 3:8, 13, 15),
    - but must hold fast to the faith until the end (Hebrews 13:6, 12, 14).

- This is a general statement based on the Theme that works for any audience.
- Old Testament passages many need filtering by the New Testament.
- These verses are considered the "warning passages" of the book of Hebrews: (1) 2:1-4; (2) 3:7-4:13; (3) 5:11-6:12; (4) 10:19-39; (5) 12:14-29.

### **Big Idea** (for our audience):

- (1) Option 1:
  - Trust God's presence... especially in his silence (for those suffering).
  - Rest in his unchanging love... especially when you've blown it (for those with guilt over past sin).
- (2) Option 2:
  - ➤ Hold on. Baby, hold on (for those discouraged by suffering).
  - Soften your heart while you can (for those intentionally walking away).

- These are examples of Big Ideas for a few specific audiences.
- The Big Idea should be based on the Theological Statement.
- "Hold On" is a soft rock song by the band Kansas.
