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 Theme (to original audience): ➤ Moses repeatedly presses YHWH ■ To accompany him and the people to Canaan, ■ Because it's YHWH's plan (:12a), YHWH's people (:13b), and YHWH's reputation (:16b). 	What is the author's main point to his ancient audience?
 Theological Statement (for all audiences): Option 1: Connect Jesus' presence as we disciple the nations with YHWH's presence with Moses. We can confidently work to disciple the nations, knowing that Jesus' presence is always with us (Matthew 28:18-20). Option 2: Connect Moses' pleading with New Testament encouragement to pray. We can confidently pray according to the character and reputation of Jesus (i.e. his name), so that the Father may be gloried in his Son (John 14:12-15). 	 This is a general statement based on the Theme that works for any audience. Old Testament passages many need filtering by the New Testament.
 Big Idea (for our audience): Option 1: Press God to equip you to prepare and present your lessons (for Bible teachers). Trust God to be with you in Tanzania (for those going on a mission trip). (2) Option 2: Expect "yes" when you plead in Jesus' name (for various audiences). Pray based on Jesus' fame not yours (for various audiences).
