#### Where Were You?

### A. [Where were you?]

- 1. I was in a warehouse in Dallas, Texas checking inventory.
  - (a) My friend Diane came out
  - (b) and asked if I heard about the two planes that hit the World Trade Center.
  - (c) I said, "No" and went back to work.
- 2. I had no concept what happened...
  - (a) Until I went into the breakroom a little later...
  - (b) And saw folks huddle around the TV.
  - (c) I couldn't believe what I saw...
    - the devastation and death.
  - (d) I eventually went into the men's room and sobbed.

#### B. [The Journey]

- 1. I was **laid off** six weeks later.
- 2. I knew things were bad when I went to a **job fair** at a hotel in north Dallas.
  - (a) Hundreds of people filing toward the entrance...
  - (b) All dressed very professionally.
  - (c) When I finally reached the recruiter's table...
  - (d) I had 30 seconds to present my case and handover my resume.
  - (e) Nothing came from that encounter.
- 3. I eventually got a **job** after Christmas.
  - (a) But my boss resigned because he refused to **cook** the **books**.
  - (b) I quit the next day.
  - (c) Eventually the owner went to prison.
- 4. Four kids. One wife. No job. Unable to continue seminary.
- 5. Then the **perfect** opportunity came along.
  - (a) I connected with the Treasurer during the interview...
  - (b) And I knew the HR director.
  - (c) It was near the seminary so I could resume school.
  - (d) It was a fulltime job that **only** required 35 hours per week.
  - (e) God had closed one door... only to open a better one.
  - (f) Except he didn't.
  - (g) I didn't get an offer.



### C. [Worship Songs]

- 1. The discouragement **crushed** me.
- 2. I remember one Sunday at church...
  - (a) The worship team sang about God's goodness.
  - (b) But I couldn't sing.
  - (c) I just stood there.
- 3. I had to face a tough question:
  - (a) Is God really **good**?
  - (b) Is it worth it to follow Jesus?

### **Book**

We are starting a new series at Redeemer Church on the first few chapters of the Book of Revelation.

I'm providing an overview this morning and highlighting one key theme.

#### **Overview**

#### A. Purpose

- 1. The Book of Revelation was written by a man named John,
  - who was a follower
  - and close friend of Jesus.
  - And he was an eyewitness to everything recorded in the book.
- 2. John was given the message by God the Father...
  - to "reveal" Jesus, his Son.
  - That's why it's called "Revelation."
  - It's written to reveal Jesus.



- 3. John encourages us to hold fast to our faith in Jesus...
  - even when experiencing
  - severe persecution,
  - intense suffering,
  - and the fallout of God's judgment.
- 4. Much of the book describes these terrifying cycles of judgment.
- 5. Revelation concludes with amazing pictures of our **future** home...
  - when **heaven** comes to earth
  - and God **dwells** with mankind.
- 6. There's no more **death**, or **tears**,
  - or mourning, or suffering,
  - or evil of any kind.
  - I Can Only Image.
- 7. John **points** to these pictures to **challenge** us to be
  - victorious, to overcome, to **conquer**,
  - to be **faithful** witnesses... even in death.
  - Because it's worth it to hold fast to Jesus.

#### B. [Context]

- 1. Chapter 1 of Revelation presents a majestic picture of the Risen Jesus.
- 2. In Chapters 2 and 3,
  - this Risen Jesus writes a **short letter**
  - to seven real churches in the ancient world.
- 3. We'll examine these seven letters in this new preaching series.

### This morning...

#### C. [Preview]

- 1. I'll walk through the first letter...
  - To illustrate the common structure across these seven letters.
- 2. Then we will then track one theme through each remaining letter.
  - I hope to convince you:
  - To **hold fast** to Jesus, because it's worth it.

Please open your Bibles to Revelation Chapter 2, verse 1.



# #1 = Ephesus (2:1-7)

Each letter has around seven components.

The **first** component tells the primary **destination** for the letter.

For example, in verse 1 we read:

1a	To the angel of the church in <b>Ephesus</b> write:

#### A. Church (2:1a)

- 1. This first letter is written to the **church** in an ancient city called **Ephesus**.
  - (c) Since it is written to a church, we know it is intended for believers.
  - (d) The amazing promises that we'll uncover are only for those who **trust** Jesus.
- 2. Note that that the letter is addressed specifically to the **angel** of the church.
  - (a) This likely indicates that an angel watches over that church and is **responsible** for it.
  - (b) And if that's true, it's also likely an angel **protects** Redeemer Church.

The **second** component of each letter **reveals** amazing characteristics of the Risen Jesus.

### B. Risen Jesus (2:1b)

1h	The words of him
10	
	who holds the seven stars in his right hand,
	who walks among the <b>seven</b> golden <b>lampstands</b> .

- 1. We know from Chapter 1 that the "seven lampstands" are the seven ancient churches.
  - (a) The "lampstand" **image** indicates that church
    - should shine the **light** of Jesus into the community.
  - (b) The "walking" image shows
    - Jesus' intimate **concern** and fellowship with the seven churches.

In the **third** component, the Risen Jesus **praises** the church for her faithfulness. Jesus praises six of the seven churches. The lukewarm church receives no praise. Listen to the praise Ephesus receives:

#### C. Praise (2:2a, 3)

2a	I know your works, your toil and your patient endurance
3	I know you are enduring patiently and bearing up for my name's sake, and you have not grown weary.



- 1. The Risen Jesus—who walks & fellowships with the seven churches—
  - This Jesus **praises** the believers in Ephesus
  - for their hard labor and patient endurance...
- 2. He **knows** what they are going through...
  - That they are **suffering** for the sake of his **name**.

In the **fourth** component, Jesus then **rebukes** the churches. **Five** of the seven churches **earn** a rebuke. Here's what Jesus says to Ephesus:

### D. Rebuke (2:4)

- But I have this against you,
  that you have **abandoned** the **love** you had at first.
  - 1. The Ephesian believers no longer **love** Jesus like they did.
    - (a) Like couples that **divorce** when their kids leave the nest,
    - (b) the Ephesians' love for Jesus grew cold over time.

In the **fifth** component... Jesus issues strong **commands** to each church. Jesus gives these orders to Ephesus:

#### E. Command (5a)

5a	Remember therefore from where you have fallen.
	Repent, and do the works you did at first.

- 1. If we **categorize** the commands to the seven churches, we find:
  - (a) Five churches are told to **repent**.
  - (b) Three churches are told to **hold fast**.
  - (c) If you do the math, then you see that one needs to **both** repent and hold fast.
  - (d) That's probably a fair **summary** of the Christian life.
    - Sometimes we need to repent.
    - Sometimes we need to hold fast.
    - Sometimes it's both.
- 2. The Ephesian believers... they need to **repent**.
  - Because they abandoned their first love.
- 3. Notice they are not told to stir up some emotion.
  - (a) They are told to act...
    - "to do the works you did at first."
    - To return to their first love.
  - (b) Again, just like in a marriage...
    - if I pursue my wife Fran and show love to her,
    - the emotions will follow.



The **sixth** component is a challenge to **listen up**, to pay attention. It's kind of a strange statement:

### F. Listen Up! (7a)

7a	He who has an <b>ear</b> ,
	let him hear what the Spirit says to the churches.

### There are four key words in this verse.

#### 1. Hear.

- (a) When we tell are kids to "listen up," what do we mean?
  - "Drew, the curfew is 11:00 pm tonight."
  - "Drew, did you hear me?"
  - Am I concerned about Drew's hearing?
  - No. It's an obedience check.

#### 2. **Ear**.

- (a) How many of you have at least one ear?
- (b) If so, then you are included in this challenge
  - and you need to pay attention.

#### 3. Churches

- (a) Notice that the "churches" is used here, rather than the "church" in verse 1.
  - In verse 7, Jesus is addressing multiple churches.
  - This means that our letter written to Ephesus...
  - Is actually binding on all churches...
    - everywhere...
    - in all time periods
    - including Redeemer Church.

#### 4. Spirit

- (a) The words of this letter are from the Holy Spirit.
- (b) Think about that...
  - This letter is **dictated** by the Risen Jesus...
  - Using words from the Holy Spirit...
  - **Recorded** by John, an eyewitness to Jesus and to everything in Revelation...
  - Addressed to an angel who watches over a real church in the city of Ephesus
  - With a message both relevant and **binding** to us at Redeemer Church.
- (c) How important is this letter?
  - Perhaps you should make a special effort to hear Jaysson the next seven weeks.

# Ancient authors used **repetition** to emphasize what was important.

	7 <b>a</b>	If you have an ear, <b>LISTEN</b> UP!

- 1. The phrase:
  - (a) "He who has an ear, let him hear what the Spirit says to the churches."
  - (b) This phrase is **repeated** to each church...
    - Word for word...
    - And letter for letter.
  - (c) An ancient writer can't **shout** any louder than this.
- 2. I need audience **participation** to help communicate Jesus' heart.
- 3. Now I know **Carol Burnett** was <u>not</u> from Ephesus.
  - (a) But I would like to borrow her sign-off signal
  - (b) To prompt you to say these words...
    - "If you have an ear...Listen up!"
    - That's shorthand for Jesus' full statement.

In the **seventh** and final component of each letter,

the Risen Jesus makes magnificent promises about our future.

The promise to Ephesus is found in verse 7.

It starts off with these words:

### G. Promise (7b)

7 <b>b</b>	To the one who <b>conquers</b> :	I

- 1. The word "conquer" means to "win victory over." 1
- 2. It's used for **sports** and **military** comparisons.<sup>2</sup>
- 3. If one football team **conquers** the other...
  - (a) Is the score 7 to 6?
  - (b) Or 56 to 0?
- 4. It's **superiority** and victory over a **defeated** foe.
- 5. **Question**: How big was Jesus' victory?
  - (a) Barely win by recovering a fumble?
  - (b) Never in doubt?
  - (c) It was a guaranteed, decisive, eternal victory.
- 6. Jesus **describes** us as **conquerors**.
  - (a) We are **victorious**... because Jesus won the victory.
  - (b) We **conquer**... because Jesus conquered Satan, sin, and death itself.

As we finish verse 7, we find a magnificent promise to those that conquer. It reads:

7b To the one who conquers:

I will grant to eat of the **tree** of **life**,
which is in the paradise of God.

- 7. We read about this **tree** in the final chapter of Revelation.
  - (a) The **river of life** flows from the throne of God and the Risen Jesus (22:1).
    - God and Jesus are the **source** of the river and the source of all life.
  - (b) The tree of life spans across this river (22:2).
    - The tree bears a different crop of fruit each month (22:2).
  - (c) And we will live forever in this new Garden.
  - (d) It will be Paradise, because we will see God's face (22:4).

My challenge... based on the promise in this letter is: Be one who conquerors...

Let's blitz through the remaining six letters.

Start in verse 8 for the second church.

# #2 = Smyrna (2:8-11)

### A. Church (8a)

8a	And to the angel of the church in Smyrna write:

In verse 8 we see that...

- 1. Jesus' second letter is to the church in Smyrna.
  - I understand from Church History...
  - This is where **Smurfs** come from.

We continue in verse 8 and see that...

#### B. Risen Jesus (8b)

8b	The words of the first and the last,
	who <b>died</b> and came to <b>life</b> .



- 1. The Risen Jesus describes himself:
  - (a) He is "the first and the last"...
    - And by implication everything in between.
  - (b) And he is "the one who died and came to life."
- 2. This of course is a reference
  - (a) to Jesus' death on the **cross** as payment for our sins...
  - (b) And his bodily **resurrection** from the dead after three days in the grave.
- 3. Jesus **conquered** death by his resurrection.
  - He won a decisive and eternal **victory**.

## In verse 9 Jesus says:

### C. Praise (9a)

9a	I know your tribulation and your <b>poverty</b>
	(but you are rich).

- 1. The church in Smyrna was suffering and poor...
  - Probably because of persecution.

### So Jesus gives them this command in verse 10:

### D. Command (10b)

	(-0.0)
10b	Be faithful unto death,
	and I will give you the crown of life.
1	

- 1. Wow!
- 2. We are starting to get a picture of what it means to conquer, to overcome, to be a victor.
- 3. We are to be "full of faith" in Jesus... even at the threat of death.
  - (a) We keep the faith... especially when **suffering**.
  - (b) We hold fast to Jesus... even in our **poverty**.
- 4. Jesus has the **cred** to ask us to **die**...
  - because he just reminded us he is the one who **died**.
- 5. He has the power to give us the **crown** of life,
  - because rose and is **living** now.

#### We have the call to listen in verse 11.

### E. Listen Up! (11a)

	. 1 \ /
11a	If you have an ear, <b>LISTEN</b> UP!



Then the Risen Jesus makes an incredible promise to this church.

### F. Promise (11b)

11b	The one who <b>conquers</b> will not be hurt
	by the second death.
	· ·

- 1. We read about a horrible place of **judgment** at the end of Chapter 20.
  - (a) If a person's name is not written in the **Book of Life** (20:15),
    - that person will be thrown into the **Lake of Fire** (20:15).
  - (b) They will be **excluded** from God's presence... forever.
  - (c) And they will be **tortured** by fire...
    - day and night
    - forever and ever (20:10).
  - (d) This **Lake** of **Fire** is also called the **Second Death** (20:14).
- 2. Jesus promises
  - (a) that those who **conquer**...
  - (b) those who hold fast to the faith
    - Will **never** be **harmed** by the **Second Death**.
    - They will never **burn** in the **Lake** of **Fire**.

11b	Hold fast to Jesus. It's worth it.

# #3 = Pergamum (2:12-17)

Let move down to verse 12 to look at the third letter.

### A. Church (12a)

12a	And to the angel of the church in <b>Pergamum</b> write:

1. Verse 12 shows this third letter going to the ancient city of **Pergamum**.

Here's how Jesus praises this church...



#### B. Praise (13b)

13b	Yet you <b>hold fast</b> my name,
	and you did not <b>deny</b> my faith
	even in the days of <b>Antipas</b>
	my faithful witness,
	who was <b>killed</b> among you,
	where Satan dwells.

- 1. The Pergamum believers already did what Jesus commanded the folks in Smyrna.
  - (a) They **hold fast** to Jesus' name... his reputation, his character.
  - (b) They refuse to **deny** the faith... even when faced with death.
  - (c) Antipas was a witness **full** of **faith**... so he **died** for his faith.
  - (d) The word "witness" in this verse is often used of martyrs.
    - A "witness" attests to the truth of something...
    - A faithful "witness" for Jesus...
      - attests to the truth of his death and resurrection...
    - We become "martyrs" in the technical sense if we die because of our testimony.
- 2. Let me ask a question.
  - (a) If the authorities hauled off Pastor Jaysson...
    - And then executed him...
  - (b) And then they started knocking on my door and your door...
    - To ask, "Are you a Christian?"
  - (c) How would you respond?

#### C. Listen Up! (17a)

	5001 Sp. (1.0)
17a	If you have an ear, LISTEN UP!

- 3. Listen to what the Holy Spirit says to the churches...
  - like those in **Afghanistan** and China.

Jesus makes two promises to the believers of Pergamum. Here's the first one.

#### D. Promises (17b)

17b	To the one who <b>conquers</b> :
	(a) I will give some of the hidden manna



- 1. If you remember from the Old Testament...
  - (a) God provided daily bread called "manna"
    - For more than two million Israelites...
    - For forty years in the wilderness.
- 2. All of our physical needs will be met in our future home.
  - No one will ever hunger or even thirst again (7:16).

### And this is the second promise:

### 17b To the one who **conquers**...

- (b) and I will give him a white stone,
  - with a new name written on the stone
  - that no one knows
  - except the one who receives it.
- 3. Jesus will give conquers a white stone.
  - (a) This is likely a valuable prize for their victory.
  - (b) White indicates their purity and righteousness.
- 4. This stone will have **new name** from Jesus written upon it...
  - (a) A name that identifies the person's essential character
  - (b) A name from Jesus that only the overcomer knows.
- 5. Do you ever feel like no one **knows** who you truly are?
  - (a) Part of the **craziness** in our society results...
    - from a desperate **search** for one's "true identity."
    - Jesus knows your true identity.
    - He will give you a priceless stone **engraved** with his **intimate** name for you.

17b	Hold fast to Jesus. It's worth it.

# #4 = Thyatira (2:18-29)

We come to the fourth church in verse 18.

#### A. Church (18a)

18a	And to the angel of the church in <b>Thyatira</b> write:

1. The fourth church is in a city called **Thyatira**.

If we drop down to verse 25, we see one of the commands Jesus gives this church.



#### B. Command (25a)

25a	Only <b>hold fast</b> what you have
	until I come.

- 1. The command is similar to what we heard with Pergamum.
- 2. This church needs to **hold fast**...
  - cling to Jesus...
  - keep the faith.
- 3. For how long?
  - Until Jesus returns.
- 4. We at **Redeemer** are responsible to **obey** this command as well.
  - We need to **hold fast** to Jesus until he returns.

We learn more about what it means to conquer in verse 26.

#### C. Promises (26-28)

2.6	Perist 4
26	The one who <b>conquers</b>
	and who keeps my works until the end

- 1. The phrases "he who conquers" is parallel with "he who keeps my works."
- 2. Jesus indicates...
  - We **conquer** by **keeping** his works.
  - We obey Jesus and keep his commandments.
  - We walk the talk.
- 3. For how long?
  - Until the end...
- 4. Notice the repetition from verse 25.
  - In 25... We **hold fast** until he **returns**.
  - In 26... We **keep** his **works** until the **end**.
- 5. That's how we become victorious conquerors.

Jesus makes two promises to conquerors in Thyatira. The first is in verse 26.

26	The one who <b>conquers</b>
	and who keeps my works until the end,
	(a) to him I will give authority over the nations

- 6. First, he will give conquerors **authority** over the nations.
  - Let that sink in a bit.
  - We will rule with Jesus.



The second promise is in verse 28.

	28	(b) And I will give him the morning star.
- 1		

- 7. Jesus will give us the **Morning Star**.
  - Any idea who that is?
  - The **end** of Revelation **reveals** that it's Jesus himself (22:16).
  - The greatest gift of all.

28	Hold fast to Jesus. It's worth it.

### D. Listen Up! (29)

29 If you have an ear, **LISTEN UP!** 

Let's move on to Chapter 3 to learn about the fifth church.

# **#5 = Sardis (3:1-6)**

#### A. Church (1a)

` '	
1	And to the angel of the church in Sardis write:

1. The fifth letter goes to **Sardis**.

Let's skip down to verse 5 to look at three promises.

#### B. Promises (5)

5a	The one who conquers  (a) will be clothed thus in white garments
	(a) will be clouded that in write garments

- 1. Folks often wonder if we'll wear clothes in our future home.
- 2. The answer is yes... white garments.
- 3. Ironically, they'll be washed **white** by the blood of Jesus (7:14).
- 4. These white garments reflect our unfathomable purity.
  - Always pure **actions**.
  - Always pure thoughts.
  - Always pure **motives**.



The second promise in verse 5 is this:

5b	(b) and I will never blot his name out of the <b>Book</b> of <b>Life</b> .

- 5. We read about Jesus' **Book** of **Life** several times in Revelation.
  - (a) If our name is **not** written in his book, we'll be thrown in the **Lake** of **Fire** (22:15).
  - (b) If our name is written in his book, we'll be allowed to live in the future home (21:27)
    - Where heaven comes to earth (21:2)
    - And God **dwells** with humankind (21:3)
    - In the **City** of God called the New Jerusalem (21:2; 9-27).
- 6. The promise here is incredible.
  - (c) A conqueror's **name** will never be **erased** from the Book of Life.
    - We will dwell with God in his city...
    - And we'll never be burned by the Lake of fire.

### Here's the third promise:

5c	(c) I will confess his name
	<ul> <li>before my Father</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>and before his angels.</li> </ul>

7. Jesus will confirm he knows us and that we are his.

5	Hold fast to Jesus. It's worth it.

# #6 = Philadelphia (3:7-13)

The letter to the sixth church starts in verse 7.

### A. Church (7a)

	7a	And to the angel of the church in <b>Philadelphia</b> write:

- 1. Any folks from Pennsylvania?
- 2. This letter is addressed to a church in Philadelphia.



We find two promises in verse 12.

### B. Promises (12)

12a	The one who <b>conquers</b> ,
	(a) I will make him a pillar in the <b>temple</b> of my God.
	Never shall he go out of it

- 1. There's a lot going on with this image.
- 2. At a minimum, the temple represents the presence of God.
  - At least one aspect of this promise
  - Is that we will always be in God's presence.

# Here's the second promise.

Title 5 the second promise.		
12b	The one who <b>conquers</b> ,	
	(b) and I will write on him	
	<ul><li>the name of my God,</li></ul>	
	<ul> <li>and the name of the city of my God,</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>the new Jerusalem,</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>which comes down from my God out of heaven,</li> </ul>

- 3. Jesus will write three names on us.
  - (a) God the Father's name.
  - (b) The name of God's city
  - (c) And Jesus' new name.
- 4. A few implications are<sup>3</sup>:
  - (a) We belong to God's.
    - We are his children.
    - We bear his name, just like my four kids bear my name.
  - (b) We are citizens of God's city.
    - We belong there. No one will ever kick us out.
  - (c) We will share in Jesus' new name.
    - We participate in his reputation and fame.

12	Hold fast to Jesus. It's worth it.

The seventh and final letter starts in verse 14.

### A. Church (14a)

	,
14a	And to the angel of the church in <b>Laodicea</b> write:

1. This letter is addressed to the angel of the church in Laodicea.

Skip all the way to verse 21 for the incredible promise to this church and to us.

#### B. Promises (21)

21	The one who <b>conquers</b> ,
	I will grant him to sit with me on my throne

- 1. Wow!
- 2. Jesus will **share** his **throne** with us.
  - He will allow us to sit and rule with him.
- 3. Do you ever feel **powerless**, like you have no voice?
  - It won't be that way in our future home.
  - We will help rule the world.

#### Let's read the entire verse now.

21	The one who <b>conquers</b> ,
	I will grant him to sit with me on my throne,
	as I also <b>conquered</b>
	and sat down with my <b>Father</b> on his throne.
	,

- 4. Jesus links our conquering with his conquering.
  - We are victorious because he won the victory.
- 5. Jesus **describes** believers as **conquerors** in each of the seven letters.
  - (a) How many times does Jesus need to say something for it to be true?
  - (b) How important is it if the Risen Jesus says it seven times?
  - (c) Also, remember each letter contains the words of the Holy Spirit.
  - (d) And remember that the entire book was given to John by God the Father.



- 6. Another **question**:
  - (a) Do you see yourself as a **conqueror**, a **victor**?
  - (b) Or as one constantly **defeated**?
  - (c) I believe your answer shows whom you're trusting.
  - (d) So if you don't see yourself ultimately as a conqueror,
    - I encourage you to **repent**
    - and believe God's Word.
